

Virginia Florence Schuck Curtis

May 17, 1924-June 20, 2005

Virginia was born in New Jersey on May 17, 1924. She attended college for two years at Mt. Holyoke in Massachusetts. In 1943, she moved to Southern California where she received a degree



in religion from Scripps College in Claremont. In 1946 she met her future husband, Dwight and they were married that September. They had two sons: Stanley, born in 1947 and Arthur, born in 1948. As the boys grew older, Virginia went to work at Portland State College where she served as the Methodist representative for Koinonia House, an ecumenical campus ministry.

In 1972, Virginia graduated from Bethany Seminary in Illinois and became an ordained United Methodist minister. She served as pastor to churches in San Jose, California as well as churches in Salem, West Portland, and Junction City, Oregon. She retired in 1987 but remained active in the church for many years. In addition to her many church activities, she also participated in the P.E.O. for over fifty years and was a finalist for "Oregon Mother of the Year" in 1984.

Virginia was preceded in death by her parents, Dr. Arthur A. and Olive Schuck, as well as her only sibling, Dr.

Arthur Schuck, Jr. She is survived by her husband of 59 years, Dwight; her two sons and their wives, Mary Ann and Sheila; her four grandchildren, Alexia, Michel Ann, Bethany, and David; and a sister-in-law, Kathryn Curtis of LaVerne, California.

Robert Francis Dowrey
February 21, 1931-May 24, 2006

Rev. Robert Francis Dowrey passed away at his home in Wednesday, May 24, 2006 at the age of 75. Bob was born the son of Charles and Jennie Dowrey on February 21, 1931 in Lowell, Massachusetts. He received his undergraduate degree from Tufts University, and hoped to become a physician. He took a year of biology at Boston University where he became more interested in theology.



Entering the U.S. Army in 1954, Bob served as a medical technician at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington, D.C. While at Walter Reed, he received his call to ministry in pastoral care. He graduated with an M. Div. from The Chicago Theological Seminary in 1959. Bob moved to Oregon and served the Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference for 36 years.

During Bob's ministry he served churches in Medford, Rainier, Weston, Sutherlin-Wilbur, Wasco, Arlington, North Powder-Union, Portland Patton Central, Nehalem-Garibaldi, Aberdeen-American Falls, Glens Ferry-King Hill, and Heppner. After retirement he served nearly eleven years as a volunteer chaplain at the Mid-Columbia Medical Center Hospital in The Dalles. Bob was actively involved in the conference camp and retreat ministry, leading camps at both Magruder and Wallowa Lake. He also served on the Conference Board of Trustees.

In 1961 Bob married Catherine Carter, his wife of 44 years. Together they had a son John, who pre-deceased him; two daughters, Leslie Gover, and Jennifer Fridley; and three grandchildren, Christopher, Steven, and Katie.

His memorial service was held in The Dalles on June 1, 2006.

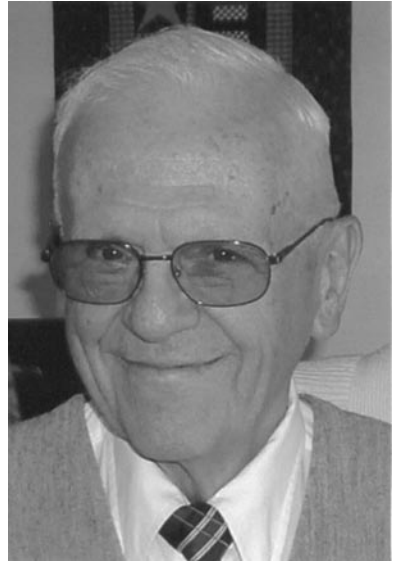
Charles Wilson Easley, Jr.

December 31, 1919-May 27, 2006

Reverend Charles Wilson Easley, Jr. died Saturday, May 27, at home in Rockaway Beach, Oregon. He was 86.

He was born in Kansas City, Missouri, the only child of Charles W. Easley, Sr. and Kathryn Marian Wheeler. He graduated from East High School in Kansas City, MO. Charles continued his education at Baker University in Baldwin City, Kansas, and seminary at Garrett Theological School in Evanston, Illinois. In 1965 he returned to seminary for one year at the Pacific School of Religion, Berkeley, CA.

Charles began serving Methodist churches as a college and seminary student. He met his first wife, Erma Annette Riedel, at Garrett and they married June 10, 1945. They moved to American Falls, Idaho, where he served his first full-time appointment and substituted as a history teacher. In Idaho he was minister to churches in Wendell, Hagerman, Buhl, Castleford, Payette, Boise, and Meridian. Charles was a District Superintendent in the Idaho Conference in the 1960s.



He served Oregon congregations in Cottage Grove, Salem, The Dalles, and Eugene. After serving in Eugene Charles retired, and he and Erma moved to Rockaway Beach, OR. Erma died in 1986. He met Mary Beal at the Magruder United Methodist Camp, and they were married on March 14, 1987, at the Roseburg United Methodist Church.

His family and friends will remember Charles for his great sense of humor. Charles enjoyed traveling throughout the United States, Canada, Europe, and China. His recent hobbies were photography and reading books on history. He sang in the Tillamook United Methodist Church choir, was a member of the chimes choir, and served on many church committees. Charles and Mary volunteered for Habitat for Humanity, worked crossword puzzles, and traveled with the Tillicum Chapter of the Good Sam Club.

In addition to Mary, Charles is also survived by daughters Marian Veley of Philomath, OR, Sylvia Salcedo of Hillsboro, OR, and Joyce Easley of Cornelius, OR.; six grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

A memorial service was held June 3 at the Tillamook United Methodist Church.

Earl Wesley Fedje

July 31, 1928-October 21, 2005



Earl Wesley Fedje was born in Mitchell, South Dakota on July 31, 1928. He was the youngest of three sons; his father (Roy Fedje, a Norwegian immigrant) was a Methodist pastor in a small Mitchell church. Earl's mother, Norma, a bubbly New Yorker, found her new environment very different from New York bustle, but her personality and love more than doubled Roy's congregation. In this depression era, Earl did numerous jobs to help the family survive. When the family moved to Oregon and served in several rural churches, Earl developed a love for the sea.

He did well in school, won scholarships to Willamette University and to Boston University where he studied philosophy and religion. In 1955, he married an Australian, Joan Russell. Earl decided to combine his love of the sea and pastoral work by joining the Navy as a chaplain in 1956. For many years, Joan

and Earl and their three children enjoyed the travel and stimulation of Navy life. They lived in San Diego, Great Lakes, Washington DC, Princeton University (where Earl achieved his Masters degree in comparative religions), Newport, Japan, and Australia.

In 1968, he was ordered to Vietnam to direct a Vietnamization Program under the guidance of his mentor, the late Admiral Zumwalt. Earl volunteered for a second tour in Vietnam and was awarded a Legion of Merit with Combat 'V', Navy Commendation Medal/Combat Action Ribbon, Presidential Unit Citation, Navy Unit Commendation, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, National Service Medal with 3 Bronze stars, Republic of Vietnam Armed forces Meritorious Unit Citation (Gallantry Cross), Republic of Vietnam First Class Civil Actions Medal, and Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal. Earl's missions in Vietnam were to educate both sides to a common belief that human needs are equal and this understanding is necessary for peace.

After Vietnam, Earl continued a highly successful "Personal Response" program in Puerto Rico. His final duty was in Honolulu, Hawaii, with the Marines in Kancohe. When Earl retired in 1977, the Marines gave him a rousing parade and expressed deep appreciation for his Naval service. The family remained in Hawaii for 17 years during which time Earl began an insurance business, became company director and used his honed "people skills" and deep spiritual beliefs to build a highly moral business where clients "came first." Hawaii's governor included Earl on a prestigious Blue Ribbon panel to reform healthcare statewide. His company, Planning Services, continues today.

When the Fedje children began their own lives, Earl and Joan moved to Colorado where Earl found numerous ways to serve. He helped establish a Credit Union, improved the local library, worked with deprived teenagers, and was always available to help with local improvement projects. Earl was a man proud of his Norwegian heritage, and proud of his father's legacy. He faced his final tragic illness with dignity, amazing courage and the deepest belief that God would give him final sanctuary with the loved ones who had preceded him. He was God's servant and with all his being, proud and honored to give whatever God required of him.

Ralph Doughton Ohling

July 7, 1923-March 15, 2006



Ralph Ohling was born July 7, 1923 in Seattle, Washington to Charles and Margaret McGilchrist Ohling. He graduated from Grant High School, in Portland, in 1941. He attended Oregon State University from 1941 to 1943 with a major in chemistry. In June of 1943 he entered the U.S. Army and served until March of 1946. He was awarded the Purple Heart while in the European Theater, from wounds received in action in 1944. While overseas he became a Christian and felt called to the ministry. He attended Willamette University from 1946-1948. He then finished his education at Asbury Theological Seminary, receiving a Masters of Divinity in 1951.

In 1951, Ralph was appointed to be the pastor at the Alpine and McFarland Methodist Churches. It was in Alpine that he met and married his wife, Maxine Larkin, on March 26, 1955. It was there that their first child, Timothy Ralph, was born. In 1966 they adopted their two daughters, Deborah Maxine and Rebekah Mary.

Ralph served as pastor at LaGrande, Monroe, West Linn, Rainier, Veneta, Unity, McCabe, Drain and Yoncalla, Shedd and Halsey, and Goldhill and Upper Rogue. He and Maxine retired in 1987 and moved to Salem. From Salem, they moved to Newberg and then to Gresham in 1998 where they made their home with their daughter Becky.

Ralph's hobbies included photography, developing his film and taking pictures at school sports events. His favorite hobby was Ham radio with the call sign of WB 700L. He belonged to a missionary net. He loved to talk on his radio whenever he could. He enjoyed jogging until his health failed and then he took to walking.

He is survived by his wife Maxine; son Timothy and his wife Mary and their two sons Paul and Robert of Scappoose; two daughters, Deborah and her son Daniel of Shedd; Rebekah McColljm and her husband, Kevin and their three daughters, Nicole, Kourtney, and Aleaca.

Glenn A. Olds

February 28, 1921-March 11, 2006

After a lifetime of public service as minister, professor, college president, ambassador and statesman, Glenn A. Olds passed away quietly on March 11, 2006. The Olds family came to Oregon by wagon train in 1850. Glenn was born in Sherwood on February 28, 1921, son of Hazel and Glenn A. Olds, Sr., logger and boxing champion, and brother of Ross and Jack Olds.

Graduating from Estacada High School (1938) and Willamette University (1942), he worked as dishwasher, forest lookout ranger, Oregon Caves guide, and dance band leader. Receiving his bachelor of divinity from Garrett Theological Seminary, Glenn was ordained in the Methodist Church, serving churches in Harrisburg, Junction City, Salem, Astoria, and Oak Park, Illinois, and was known throughout life for his inspirational sermons. With a master's degree from Northwestern and PhD from Yale University in philosophy in 1948, he was appointed professor of philosophy at Depauw University, Garrett, and Northwestern. He taught at eight other institutions including American University and Portland State University, and worked as University of Denver chaplain and director of Cornell United Religious Works.

At age 37, Glenn became president of Springfield College in Massachusetts, and in 1965, University Dean of international studies and world affairs in the State University of New York system. He served under four U.S. Presidents (Eisenhower, Kennedy, Johnson, and Nixon) as consultant to the Peace Corps, principal architect of VISTA in the War on Poverty, special assistant for policy and manpower development to President Nixon, and U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations Economic and Social Council.

Arriving as president of Kent State University in 1971, his mission was to heal a troubled campus following the shooting tragedy there. In 1977 he undertook the challenge of re-opening a Methodist liberal arts college in Anchorage as president of Alaska Pacific University. In 1986 he ran a close race as Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate in Alaska. President and CEO of the Fetzer Foundation and Ted Turner's Better World Society, Glenn returned to Alaska to work with the Governor as Commissioner of Commerce and Economic Development and of Natural Resources.



He served on boards of numerous public service associations, chaired the World Federalist board and co-chaired the Council of Senior Fellows for the Society for Values in Higher Education. Author and recipient of 10 honorary doctorates here and abroad, he was widely known as one of America's premier public speakers.

Glenn is survived by his wife and life partner in service, Dr. Eva B. Olds, poet, professor and oral interpreter; daughter, Dr. Linda E. Olds, professor of psychology and religious studies at Linfield College; son Dr. G. Richard Olds, chair of medicine at Medical College of Wisconsin; daughter-in-law, Jackie E. Olds; and grandchildren, Glenn R. Olds, Jr. and wife Tori, J. Michael Olds, and Trevor N. Olds.

Roger William Thompson

December 20, 1918-September 13, 2005



Roger was born and raised in Syracuse, NY, on December 20, 1918, the only child of James Jay Thompson of New York State and Alice Melinda Head of Ontario, Canada. Roger graduated from Blodgett Vocational High School in January of 1938. He was a graduate of Tusculum College in Greeneville, Tennessee, graduating in June of 1944. While at Tusculum, he met, courted, and fell in love with his Southern Belle, Mary Lucile Corbett. Roger felt a calling to serve the Lord in pastoral ministry and was greatly influenced by his youth pastor, the Reverend Gordon Gould, a Native Alaskan. Roger attended Drew Theological Seminary where he earned a Bachelor of Divinity degree. On August 29, 1946, Roger and Mary were married and began a 59-year marriage together.

Roger and Mary were parents of five children, all born in New York: Melinda Lucile, Roger William, Jr., Mary Ann, James Corbett and John Mark Thompson. Nine grandchildren

were welcomed into the family: Jay, Matt, Jim, Heather, Sadie, Allison, Natalie, Amy and Megan. Nine great-grandchildren added joy to his life: Chelsea, Joshua, Austin, Riley, Kaitlyn, Sidney, Regan, Reese and Matthew.

During his career as a minister in the United Methodist Church, he served several churches on Long Island, New York: Woodbury, West Hills, Cold Spring Harbor, Albertson, and Northport. In 1961, he felt a calling to serve in the Alaska Missionary Conference, where he served First Methodist Church in Anchorage. Following his six years' tenure in Alaska, he returned to Dobbs Ferry, NY, and then to Meriden, CT, prior to a second calling to the Anchorage ministry. He concluded his forty-one year career serving two United Methodist churches in the greater Portland area: Tualatin and Montavilla. Guided by his stewardship and leadership ability, congregations grew, churches were built or expanded, and the lives of many people in his church and community were influenced.

Roger had many interests. He was an active Rotarian for 30 years. He enjoyed photography, tinkering in his woodshop, and making sure his car was shiny and running well. He loved camping with his family and friends and traveling just wherever the Lord would lead him. Roger and Mary appreciated good music together.

Upon retirement in 1985, Roger and Mary moved to Odell, Oregon, where they spent almost twenty years. In 2005, with Roger's health failing, they moved into an assisted living facility in Hillsboro, Oregon, close to three of their grown children and their families. On September 13, 2005, with Mary and his family at his side, he was welcomed into his heavenly home.

Patricia Ann Easley

June 27, 1931-October 24, 2005

Patricia Ann “Pat” Peterson Easley died October 24, 2005, of advanced breast cancer. She was 74. She was the wife of the Reverend Henry Easley, a member of the Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference. Rev. Easley served at Seaside and Drain-Yoncalla before retiring in 1997. He also served in the Mississippi Conference and as an army chaplain.

Pat was born June 27, 1931, in Tacoma, to Konrad and Cora Berg Peterson. She graduated from Peninsula High School in Gig Harbor, Washington, and later received a bachelor’s degree in music from the University of Oregon. She had lived in the Eugene area for 19 years.

A member of the Oregon Music Teachers Association, the American Guild of Organists and the Eugene Symphony Guild, Pat also was active in PEO and the music program at First United Methodist Church, and was musician for the Sons of Norway.

Pat served as organist for Army chapels and for the Seaside, Drain and Yoncalla United Methodist Churches. She substituted in 14 churches in the Eugene/Springfield area.

Pat received the Bi-Centennial Hymn Award at the 1983 Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference for the hymn “With God We Will Succeed,” written with cooperation by Melodie Chenevert, a member of Seaside UMC. It was chosen to be used to commemorate the Bi-Centennial in 1984 and is printed in the 1983 Journal. The Sanctuary Choir of First UMC, Eugene sang the hymn at Pat’s memorial service. It is an inspiring hymn with a Wesleyan emphasis.

Survivors include her husband, Henry Easley; a daughter, Carrie Easley **and** son-in-law N. B. Moore of LaVergne, Tennessee; two brothers and seven sisters.

Memorial services were held in Gig Harbor and in Eugene.



Marjorie Armstrong Brown Harvey

September 10, 1928-July 27, 2005

Music was Marjorie's life—music given to God. She started early piano lessons at age four, playing the organ at the First Presbyterian Church of Indianola, Iowa, as soon as her feet could reach the pedals. But Marjorie was too spirited and energetic to do nothing but music. She loved to ride the horse her father gave her after she had learned to fall from the top rung of a step ladder, falling on her shoulder without hurting herself.

Marjorie went to Cottey College, a two-year school for women in Nevada, Missouri, majoring in music. During that time, she joined the P.E.O., a women's organization which was important to her all her life. She returned to Indianola to graduate from Simpson College.



After a semester of graduate study in music at Illinois James Millikan University, Marjorie tried office work for a while, but it didn't take! She began to consider going to seminary to study music and theology. In the meantime, she spent a summer in Norway with the Experiment in International Living. Crossing on a student ship, they encountered a hurricane in the mid-north Atlantic. All passengers were ordered to their staterooms. Everyone went, except one person—Marjorie. She had one arm wrapped around the railing just outside the stateroom, laughing with the foam in her face and having a glorious time. A crew member promptly and firmly ushered her to her stateroom.

Shortly after her return from Norway, Marjorie contracted polio. She was totally paralyzed for three days. She just barely recovered sufficiently

to leave for San Francisco Theological Seminary in the fall of 1953. By divine coincidence (Bob was convinced), Bob returned to the Seminary that fall after a year's internship. Some time in February, Bob and Marjorie stopped eyeing each other with suspicion. On April 18, 1954 they were engaged. On October 5th of the same year, they were married.

Marjorie provided a ministry of music in all the churches that she and Bob served: organist, choir director, children's choir, bell choir, though never all at the same time. There was a lull during the birthing and rearing of three children. It was an opportunity to develop her skill as a teacher.

While serving the First Presbyterian Church in Twin Falls, Idaho, Marjorie had two excellent opportunities. When Kitty and Earl Riddle left Twin Falls to take an appointment at Caldwell, Kitty recommended Marjorie to replace her as accompanist for an excellent voice teacher. She also studied with a distinguished piano teacher and concert artist.

In Portland and Beaverton, Marjorie did professional accompanying, was organist, and choir director at the Beaverton United Methodist Church. She built up a large studio of private piano students.

While at Morningside, Marjorie again developed a large studio and filled in as organist from time to time. As she did every place, she worked in local state and national Music Teachers' Associations. When Marjorie and Bob went to Liberia to teach at the Gbarnga School of Theology, Marjorie taught a few students on a battery-operated keyboard and led a choir of 10 or 12 students who couldn't read a note of music. She loved it!

Marjorie was an avid bridge player, loved camping, and accompanied Bob on several back-packing trips. Already affected by post-polio syndrome before going to Liberia, Marjorie suffered extensive injuries in a devastating vehicle accident while traveling in a local minivan. After returning to the States, she resumed teaching piano but she was never really well again. She was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease in late 1997. She spent the last three years of her life in a secured unit of a nursing home and died on July 27, 2005.

Hilda Pearl McMurtrey

August 21, 1916-December 26, 2005

Hilda McMurtrey died December 26, 2005 at the Milwaukie Convalescence Center where she suffered from Alzheimer's disease. She was born August 21, 1916 in Springdale, Arkansas to Pearl Sullivan and Hillry Kuechler. Her early childhood was in Kiefee, Oklahoma.

Hilda attended Northeastern Teachers College in Tablequah, Oklahoma where she met John L. McMurtrey. They were married December 20, 1941 in Kiefee. They had three children, Ann, Bob and Jerry, who were born during the war years.

The McMurtreys moved to Oregon in 1947. Hilda taught school at Glenpool High School, Glenpool, Oklahoma; Illinois Valley High School, Cave Junction, Oregon; Wasco Junior High, Wasco, Oregon; Sherman County High School, Moro, Oregon; and Ogden Junior High School in Oregon City, Oregon.

After retirement, John and Hilda traveled to many corners of the world. When their health failed, they moved to The Town Village, in Clackamas, Oregon until John died in 2001. Hilda moved to Milwaukie Convalescence Center when she was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease.

Hilda is survived by her three children and their spouses: Ann McMurtrey, Bob and Debra McMurtrey, and Jerry and Gail McMurtrey; her six grandchildren and spouses: Christian and Jennifer McMurtrey, Jason and Jami McMurtrey, Stephen and Angi McMurtrey, Melissa McMurtrey, Kenneth and Staci McMurtrey Caldwell and Amy McMurtrey; and her four great-grandchildren: Felicia McMurtrey, Mathew McMurtrey, Caelan McMurtrey and Connor McMurtrey.

Martha C. Schneider

December 16, 1911-October 21, 2005

Martha Chloe Rinehart was born on December 16, 1911 to Rufus and Leota Rinehart on their farm in Rose County, Ohio. Paint Creek flooded that December and mother and baby had to be evacuated from the bedroom window of the second floor in a rowboat.

Martha grew up in a loving family which included four brothers and two sisters. Every morning after breakfast the family gathered by the big dining room window for devotions. It was then off to school carrying a baked potato to keep their hands warm and also to be their lunch at noontime. As a teen-ager during a missionary service, Martha felt God call her to be a missionary to India. She attended Chicago Evangelistic Institute where she met David. What a great romance: concerts in the park, museums (free on Thursdays), walks along Lake Michigan and all of this during the Great Depression.

They were married on July 6, 1935 in the parlor of her parents' home. In that same home Mary Martha was born the following year. Karolyn was born in 1937 in San Antonio, Texas where they were on a missionary outreach. David was teaching at a bible school for Mexican nationals. After completing their class work at the Institute, Martha, David and the girls took a train to Seattle with the anticipation of boarding a ship for India.

At the last moment, a telegram cancelled their plans for India because of the unrest there. Instead of India, David and Martha went to work in Guatemala.

In 1945, a place opened up with World Gospel Mission in Honduras where David worked with persons in the villages of the country. Martha gained respect and acceptance of the local people and respected their customs and culture. She taught English in the local high school.



Returning from furlough, Martha attended Greenville College in Illinois and received her Bachelor of Arts degree. They returned to Costa Rica to work under the United Methodist Board of Global Ministry. In 1963, they returned to the United States and to the then Oregon Conference. They served at Chiloquin-Fort Klamath, Springfield-St. Paul, Portland-Wilshire, Laurelwood, Errol Heights, and Klamath Falls before retiring in 1976. They enjoyed their retirement years in Woodburn. Martha served on the Worship committee of the Woodburn United Methodist Church.

Martha still had a sense of humor in her later years. She had a number of infirmities and struggled with dementia. When life was difficult, she used to say that she needed to "take myself in hand." Her watchwords were: persevere, overcome, keep going, change, forgive and love. As she indicated, she was finding it necessary to "take herself in hand—a lot, lately."

Alta Rachel Wetzel

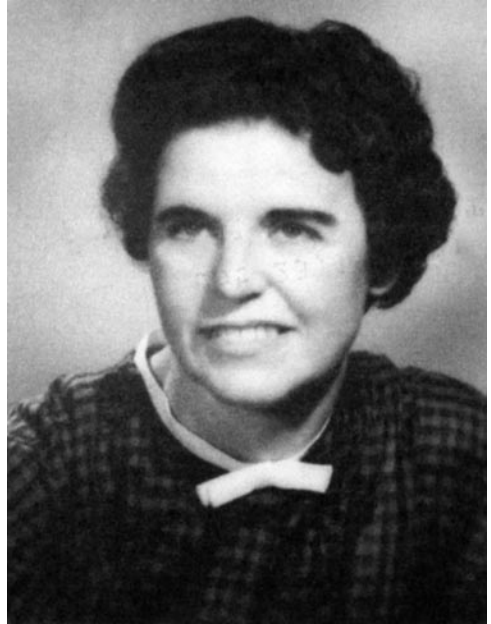
August 23, 1917-January 20-2006

Alta was the soloist and pianist, and thus began her life as a loving wife of her minister husband. Assignments followed in Florence, Dallas, and Albany, Oregon. They then served in Spokane and Seattle before returning to Portland. After they retired, they lived in Kirkland, Bellevue and finally at Sequim, Washington..
